News from People for Education

Gaps between "have" and "have not" schools

Mind the Gap: Inequality in Ontario's Schools is a new report from People for Education. The report shows that average family incomes have an impact on the resources and programs in schools.

People for Education used data from EQAO to compare schools by average family incomes, looking at the 10 per cent of elementary schools with the highest incomes and the 10 per cent with the lowest.

What did they find?

• Students in high-income schools are more likely to be identified as gifted;

• 26% of high-income schools have French Immersion programs, compared to 7% of low-income schools; and

• Students in high-income schools are much more likely to have the chance to participate in a choir or band.

The annual report on schools shows that provincial spending on special education is at an all-time high, as are the number of students who are receiving special education support.

Readiness for school affects success

A new report from McMaster University and the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) shows that children who appear less "ready for school" in senior kindergarten may also be less likely to reach the provincial standard on Grade 3 EQAO tests. The study also showed:

• Students who changed schools between kindergarten and Grade 3 were less likely to do well in grade 3.

• Kindergarten boys were more likely to be in the "vulnerable" and "at-risk" categories than girls.

• 65% of the oldest children (born between January and March) in senior kindergarten were "ready" or "very ready" for school, compared to only 45% of the youngest children (born between October and December). Younger children continue to do less well in Grade 3 and 6, are more likely to be in applied math in Grade 9, and are less likely to pass the grade 10 literacy test. Newcomers to Canada are getting ready for school

The program Ready for School Connects is a school readiness program for newcomer families with children starting kindergarten. The program has supported more than 900 newcomer families since 2002.

The program engages the whole family. So while students participate in the school readiness program, parents and guardians attend workshops to learn about Ontario's education system (presented by People for Education).

The program also includes a Healthy Child Screening to identify possible health and learning challenges early. Older and younger siblings are accommodated in a childcare program to ensure that all parents can participate fully.
