Staying safe on the Net – Parent workshop

The Internet can be an incredible learning, teaching and socializing tool for children. Many of us have Internet accessible electronic devices at home like computers, cell phones, gaming systems or tablets. Your children may be using these devices to do multiple things such as play games, watch videos, read, download/listen to music, chat, text, post pictures, research and webcam.

Aside from the Internet's benefits, are you aware of its potential risks for children like loss of privacy, Internet predators, cyber-bullying and marketing scams? If so, are you wondering what you can do to ensure your child is safe and behaving responsibly on-line?

On Wednesday May 9 the Education Committee ill hold its first parenting workshop called "Streetproof Your Child for the Internet." Join Internet safety expert Steve Chapelle as he discusses and answers questions about:

- Set-up and use of no-cost parental controls
- Social networking sites (e.g. Facebook, Skype)
- Cyberbullying
- File sharing (e.g. music, videos)
- User account security

Urdu and Gujarati translators will be available during the workshop. At the end of the evening parents can take home a free 42-page handbook containing detailed instructions for each of the above topics.

Snacks will be served at 6:30pm in the staff room and the workshop will begin at 7pm in the library. Childcare will be available in Room 16.

Steve will also be presenting Internet safety workshops to Grades 3-4 and Grades 5-6 on Thursday May 10.
