ALTERNATIVE SCHOOLS FOR GRADE 7

If you are a parent of a grade 6 student, one of the options your child may be considering for next year is attending an alternative school. Each alternative school has a distinct identity and approach to curriculum delivery. They usually have a small student population, and a focus on a particular programming or theme. For example, alternative schools may focus on an arts-based curriculum or offer programming that is very project-based and student-directed. Many alternative schools seek high levels of parental involvement. School profiles are available at www.tdsb.on.ca.

What are the local alternative schools?

In the Wilkinson area, two alternative schools offer grade 7 and grade 8 programming. They are:

How are students admitted to alternative schools?

Most alternative schools admit students by lottery. Application forms are given out at an annual Information Night which both parent and student must attend.

The principal is responsible for the successful running of the school. It is his job to manage the staff, make sure Ministry and school board policy is followed, and to ensure the safety of everyone in the building. Allan's office is located just inside the front doors, on the left. It's best to contact him by phone or email to set up an appointment. Parents will have the most luck calling after the morning rush, which ends around 9:15am.

Wilkinson is fortunate to have a vice principal, who shares responsibilities with the principal. You can contact Leasa about any school matter, but especially if your concern is about the lunchroom or lice. Her office is directly above Allan's, and accessible by the set of stairs across from the large central stairwell.

Usually, problems can be resolved by working with the principal or vice principal. If you feel unsatisfied with how your problem was handled at this level, however, you can discuss the matter with the person the principal reports to, the superintendent.

If you are not satisfied even after consulting the superintendent, you can contact the school board trustee, who may be able to mediate. Trustees help set board policy and make funding decisions. Like the superintendent, they work for a family of schools, not just ours. Unlike the people listed above, who are hired by the Toronto District School Board, trustees are elected to office by you. They are elected to represent your views.
