## **Important Information**

### Wilkinson Food Drive!

From December 15 to 22, Wilkinson will be holding a food drive. Please drop off canned goods and other non-perishables in the morning before school or at lunchtime. There will be a drop off point outside Room 3.

Remember, the most needed items include:

- baby formula & food
- beans & lentils
- canned fruits & vegetables
- canned fish & meat
- cans of soup or hearty stew
- dried pasta & tomato sauce
- macaroni & cheese
- peanut butterrice
- canned, powdered or tetra pak cartons of milk

#### **Head Lice**

In order to try and eliminate head lice from our student population, a public health nurse and I will check every student's head for lice and nits a couple of times throughout the year. If it appears that a student has an infestation, the parent/guardian will be called and a letter will be sent home. Children will not be informed in the classroom in order to maintain confidentiality. In accordance with TDSB procedures, the parent/guardian will be required to make arrangements for treatment and to keep the child home until the problem is cleared. We can provide a Treatment Instruction Sheet.

If you would like more information on head lice, contact the Toronto Health Department at (416) 338-7600 or visit its website at <a href="https://www.toronto.ca/health">www.toronto.ca/health</a>. I am also happy to answer questions.

### Here are some suggestions for controlling the spread of lice:

- Discourage head-to-head contact and sharing of hats, scarves, hairbrushes, combs and hair ribbons;
- Tie long hair back in braids;
- Check heads of all family members and people in close contact:
- Treat all family members with head lice at the same time;
- Check young school-age children weekly for head lice, more often if there is an outbreak.

### If you do find lice or nits on your child's head:

- Tell all close contacts to check their heads; and
- Tell the child's teacher and/or day-care worker.

### LITERACY NIGHT - THURS. NOV. 24, 2011

### **CURRICULUM INFUSED ART**

The Junior and Senior Kindergarten North Playground is undergoing a facelift. Wilkinson students and parent volunteers are creating new art installations, which will be installed over the next few months of the 2011/2012 school year. The idea to create curriculum-based art installations was born on a grounds' tour of Wilkinson in 2009

and was brought to life by Kirsten McGoey with the help of MANY contributing members of the 2009/2010/2011 Wilkinson School Community Councils and the feedback of the 2010/11 Kindergarten staff at Wilkinson.

Charles Pascal writes in his document *Every Child, Every Opportunity*, that the role of play is extremely important both inside and outside of the classroom. "Play is a vehicle for learning and lies at the core of innovation and creativity," he explains. "It provides opportunities for learning in a context in which children are at their most receptive. Play and academic work are not distinct categories for young children, and learning and doing are also inextricably linked for them"

To reinforce the curriculum already being delivered in the classroom, this playground art project is designed to provide play resources for teachers to dovetail into their current lessons. The project will also reintroduce these concepts while the children participate in free outside play or perhaps while using the space during a weeknight or weekend visit with parents, caregivers and friends.

The first workshops on the alphabetical and numerical panels to hang along the fence enclosure were completed at the end of November 2011. JK and SK students got their hands dirty painting patterns on 2x2 plywood panels, which will be transformed into letters and numbers by older Wilkinson students and parents. Our friends at Dandylion also got their hands dirty allowing future Wilkinson students a chance to shape their future main play space.

Look for these creations and other installations to be added soon to enliven this outdoor learning and play space. Interested in getting involved?
