MEETING RECAP

The Wilkinson School Community
Council met on February 13, 2006. The
principal's report included an update on

the potential CUPE walkout as well as an update about the measures Wilkinson is taking to control head lice. The next school-wide check is scheduled for April 3rd. The vice-principal, Lisa Watt, is the contact for this.

The monthly Statement of Financial Position was distributed and reviewed. There is currently over \$12,000 available for disbursement.

A member of the community attended the meeting to raise concerns about the noise and disturbance caused by the current location of the basketball nets and after school usage. Possible solutions were discussed. At the next meeting, the Council will review funding needed for retractable basketball nets that can be taken down at the end of each day.

Committee updates were presented from:

- Greening and grounds (working with Wilkinson's Environmental Club),
- Communications (new website launched read further for more information on this), and
- Fundraising (reported on funds raised from the

Dominion-Save-a-Tape program and from movie nights and pizza lunches, which continue to be popular and well attended. Preparations for the Fun Fair have begun and a proposed budget will be presented at the next Council meeting.)

The next Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 7th at 7:00pm in the staff room. Everyone is welcome to attend. Childcare will be available.

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SPOTLIGHT



LISA WATT - WILKINSON'S NEW VICE-PRINCIPAL

Wilkinson said good-bye to Jonathan Root as viceprincipal in December, who was promoted to principal of Bruce P.S. Karen Geraci took a few moments to find out a little more about our new vice-principal...

Just before the holiday break in December, Lisa Watt learned she would be taking on the position of vice-principal at Wilkinson. It was a busy few weeks of preparation, but the transition has been remarkably smooth. Crediting a supportive principal and staff, Ms Watt explains, "It has really been an easy adjustment. Everyone has been so helpful and patient. I think the first two weeks I asked a million questions, but I got to know everyone's names, meet many parents, and got to know the staff."

Ms Watt comes to Wilkinson after four and a half years at Thorncliffe Park Public School, where she taught in the primary grades. The last two years she served as the school's literacy coordinator. Prior to that, she taught at Highcastle School in Scarborough. The move to Thorncliffe meant a big learning curve. "I went from Highcastle, which had 300 kids, to Thorncliffe Park, which has 1,700 students just from kindergarten to grade 5."



Not surprisingly, space was at a premium at Thorncliffe, where some offices were carved from closets to accommodate the growing school population. Ms Watt muses, "When I arrived there were 47 portables. We had contests to name the

streets between portables, mostly after our favourite books and authors." Happily, space isn't quite the issue it was, and all students are now accommodated within the main building.

Since graduating from teacher's college at OISE/University of Toronto, Ms Watt has taken additional qualifications in mathematics education, special education, reading and ESL. A native of Richmond Hill, she enjoys the downtown experience and the diversity it offers.

Ms Watt's responsibilities at Wilkinson include addressing behavioural concerns with children, arranging supply teachers and organizing EQAO testing in the spring. In addition, she hopes to bring some of her experience in early years literacy initiatives to Wilkinson. Last year Ms Watt coordinated a volunteer reading program at Thorncliffe Park, matching community volunteers with struggling readers in grade 3 for one-to-one supportive reading sessions. The program was a hit, and resulted in most participants meeting grade level expectations by the end of the year. Ms Watt sees these kinds of programs as a great way to both increase kids' skill levels and community involvement.

And speaking of community involvement, look for Ms Watt at this year's Wilkinson Fun Fair on May 27th, where she has promised to participate in a meaningful way....We've even heard rumours of a dunk tank.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION

Q: I notice that our winter and spring concerts showcase instrumental performances. How do Wilkinson students become involved?

A: In addition to our choirs and Orff, Wilkinson offers an instrumental program to grade five and six students: string and concert band. Mr. Ron Harry teaches string (viola, violin and cello), while Mr. Ross Wooldridge covers band (flute, trumpet, trombone, French horn and clarinet.) Both teachers hail from Earl Grey school, where they teach music.

Every September, Mr. Harry or Mr. Wooldridge, puts on a presentation to the grade five students. An information letter is sent home and those interested in participating take an informal music aptitude test. According to Mr. Harry, the test is mainly an "ear test" – a simple determination as to whether the student understands and responds to tune, rhythm and pitch. This is to ensure that the budding musician won't become frustrated down the road, he says.

Once a student has parental permission and has passed the aptitude test, he or she is assigned an instrument. Although some instruments are available to borrow from the school, sometimes they need to be rented from an outside source for a reasonable cost. A violin rental for the school year might cost \$150, for example.

Once the ensembles are formed, the musicians leave their classes twice a week to practice for 45 minutes and are encouraged to practice for 20 minutes on their own time at least four times a week.

The only entry point for this program is in grade five, at which time the students are making a two-year commitment.
